Holy Week is Here!

With Palm Sunday we have officially reached the end of Lent and the beginning of Holy Week. Holy Week is a sacred time of transition between Lent and Easter. A time for reflection and contemplation as we follow Jesus from his triumphal entry into Jerusalem throughout his last days until the cross, and then wait at the tomb for resurrection to spring forth. It's one of the most beautiful and rewarding parts of the church year. But to let this time really impact you, it will mean participating in each of the services between Maundy Thursday and Easter.

In a way, holy week is its own form of pilgrimage. We might not travel to Jerusalem, but we have the same opportunity to be immersed in the story of Christ. To set aside some of the things going on in our lives for the chance to pick up anew this story of salvation. As a pastor it's difficult to ask people to come to church 4 days in one week. But I'm going to, because I firmly believe it will be worth your time. To experience this story in its rich fullness can bring such wonderful depth to your faith. I encourage you to come out for all of our holy week services. But if you can't, take a moment before Easter comes around to read the passion story from Mark:14:1-15:47. Mark this time between Palm Sunday and Easter with times of reading and prayer. If you can make it to all four services, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday, I promise you won't regret it. I wanted to take a little time to give you a quick primer of the Triduum (Three Days) with some tips to prepare you for each service.

Maundy Thursday - Thursday, March 29th at 7 P.M.

We join Jesus and the disciples in experiencing an act of great care and vulnerability. There is something powerful in this display of service. I know you may think it's weird or uncomfortable, but it's also a powerful display of Jesus' love. I encourage you to accept the invitation and try it. This year after having your feet washed you will have the option of staying to wash the foot of the person after you. We will also experience the dramatic moment as we move from sharing a meal around the altar, to seeing it stripped and left bare as we enter into Good Friday. A couple helpful tips for the service. First, you don't need a manicure, but if you make sure your toes are trimmed up you will feel much more confident in participating. Also, wear shoes you can easily take on and off.

Good Friday – Friday, March 30th at 7 P.M.

The Tenebrae service is very powerful with multiple readers and music. In it we participate in the story of our saviors death and come to terms with the weight our own sin. It can be a very emotional service so I recommend grabbing a tissue on your way to your seat.

Easter Vigil – Saturday, March 31st at 7 P.M.

The Vigil is a service of movement as we begin outside around a newly struck fire. We will continue into the Kammerer room to hear some of the stories of God's salvation and then up to the sanctuary as we remember the promises in our baptism and become the first to celebrate the risen Savior.

I look forward to worshipping with you this Holy Week,


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APRIL WORSHIP & MUSIC NOTES:



Hi! First I want to thank all of you for your prayers and support! I have now been working with the Recycled and Redeemed ministry for three months. It has been full of ups and downs, but through each part God has been with me and taught me so much! I feel so much joy by accepting His call in my life. I am so grateful for your support. Below are some pictures of what I have bought (so far) of the children I work with.

-Basic supplies: Pencils, pens, markers, crayons (triangular shaped!), play-dough.

-Sensory!: In this picture are items I have bought, so far, for sensory play. (For my children with autism, and those who just need some stimulation to relax.)

This is a book I bought for a child who will hopefully start school again. He will be placed in second grade, but since he was unable to stay in school before he does not know how to read or write. I am also planning on buying a book to work on phonemic awareness.

There are not many items in the pictures because where I live there is not a big selection. I am going to the capital this week (for my visa renewal), and I plan to buy the following items:

-folders (to use as speech folders for each child.)

-stickers

-Laminating sheets, 2 binders, Velcro, computer paper


these items are small, but invaluable! I will be making communication books for two of my clients that are nonverbal. I will also be searching for more items for sensory play.

I want to thank you all for your contribution to the ministry. As more children come to the clinic, their needs change, and I will continue to use the money you have blessed the ministry with as the needs come.

FROM THE DESK OF THE PARISH NURSING TEAM:

This month as we anticipate celebrating the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, we have chosen to share with you what is called the **Wholeness Wheel**. This 'Wheel' was actually developed in 1997 by the Inter-Lutheran Coordination Committee on Ministerial Health and Wellness of the ELCA and the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. This was created as a tool to aid in understanding the complexity of health and wellness; and believe it or not, the components still apply to us as a Christian living in today's world. An essential feature of the Wholeness Wheel is that it holds at its' center the belief that in baptism, God offers new life in Christ and welcomes the baptized into the community of faith. Baptism turns the wheel, and the various dimensions of health are expressed in the context of spiritual well-being.

God's grace is the force behind health and wellness journeys because God is present in every aspect of our well-being. So the Wholeness Wheel is a personal journey that presents each of us with unique opportunities to steward our gifts in all dimensions of our lives. It is up to us to tend to these dimensions of our well-being so we may live as resilient people for the sake of the world.

The Wholeness Wheel, as depicted by the accompanying graphic at the end of this article, is made up of spiritual, vocational, intellectual, emotional, physical, social, and financial dimensions. Spiritual well-being is intertwined with and influences our well-being in all the dimensions. As sanctified children of God, we respond to what God, in Christ Jesus, has done for us through proper stewardship of all that we have been given. Among those blessings are the various components of our health as shown by the Wholeness Wheel.

IN BAPTISM: A NEW CREATION

At the center of the wheel, we are a new creation through the waters of baptism. Christ lives in us and through us, and calls us out to love and serve one another. What does it mean to be a new creation? We have received the gift of grace through Christ, who came that we might have abundant life. Abundant life is living as a new creation, being grounded and centered in Christ and loving our neighbor as ourselves. It is when we are living well in Christ that we are best equipped to pass on our faith.

SPIRITUAL WELL BEING:

Living a centered life focused on God affects each aspect of our well-being. Turn to God for strength as you seek to live well in Christ. Nurture your relationship with God through prayer, devotions, worship, nature, art, and music. Explore who you are and know whose you are.

SOCIAL/INTERPERSONAL WELLBEING:

We are created by God to be social beings, living in community and instructed to help and love each other. We maintain social well-being through interaction, play and forgiveness. Take time to nurture your relationships with family, friends, congregation and co-workers.

EMOTIONAL WELLBEING:

Being emotionally well means feeling the full range of human emotions and expressing them appropriately. Self-awareness is the first step. Recognizing and honoring your own feelings and those of others — stress, contentment, anger, love, sadness, joy, resentment — will help you live life abundantly.

PHYSICAL WELLBEING:

While we are not all born perfectly healthy or able to live life without injury or illness, we can live well by tending and nurturing our body as a gift from God. Feed it healthy foods, keep it hydrated, build physical endurance through regular exercise, and respect your body's need for rest.

FINANCIAL WELLBEING:

Being financially well involves making decisions based on our values, as reflected in the way we save, spend, and share. Tending to one's financial well-being in this way requires us to be resilient, generous, and focused on sustainability.

VOCATIONAL WELLBEING:

We all have a calling — a vocation — to follow Christ's example by living a life of meaning, purpose and service to our neighbor. Our vocations make up our life's work and passions — they are the everyday roles through which God calls us to help make this world a better place. Those who are well vocationally are faithful stewards of their talents and abilities, and find opportunities to build and use them.

INTELLECTUAL WELLBEING:

Using our minds keeps us alert and active. Stay curious, ask questions, and seek answers. Explore new responsibilities, experience new things and keep an open mind. And remember, knowing when and how to let your mind rest is as important as keeping active.

In conclusion, our efforts to improve our personal wellness, then, are a part of our sanctified living — as in every aspect “We are to grow up in every way into Him who is the head, into Christ.” (Ephesians 4:15). Until that time when we are with God face to face, we strive, with His help and guidance, to **Be Well** in all areas of the Wholeness Wheel so that we can **Serve Well** those in our care.


